Programme Notes

Chamber Ensemble **Mirage** Matthew Lam

The music is inspired by mirage, and the composer aims not only to depict mirage in this piece but also to explore various timbre and effects for chamber Chinese music ensemble.

The structure of the music is very simplistic, in ABABA form. In A sections, harmonics are ubiquitously employed by the plucked string instruments and the bowed string instruments with the compositional technique of aleatory music, aiming to describe the mirage. As the music develops, the main melody would slowly appear. B sections are constructed upon 6 chords, and sheng takes the leading role. The 6 chords are not traditional triads, for example, one of them is a quartal harmony which only consists of perfect 4ths. By this, the music could build is unique momentum which could not be achieved by conventional harmony. Lastly, it is worth mention that in the first half of the music, the composer avoids using pitches from the lower register to facilitate a floating feeling. Lower register pitches would only appear in the latter part of the music to match the music's development.

Lam is an active composer with a keen interest in contemporary music, and for this focus, he has been exploring and experimenting with new styles and techniques. His works have been heard on many musical occasions, including the Bauhinia Concert (2017 and 2018), 'Musical Convergence' concert presented by the Hong Kong Composers Guild, 'Music from the Heart' concert presented by the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Toolbox International Creative Academy 2020 opening concert, and on air by RTHK Radio 4. Ensembles that have performed his works include the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Mivos Quartet of USA, Music-joint Association, Stellar Trio, and Toolbox Percussion.

Tranquility Wong Ching-yin

Matthew Lam Composer

Matthew Lam is a Music undergraduate at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, with specialism in Composition. His mentors included Professor Chan Kai-young and Dr Phoebus Lee Kar-ta, and currently Dr Lo Hau-man. He is also taking piano lessons from Dr Timothy Kwok Ka Ho. As winner of the Toolbox Percussion International Composition Competition 2019 (TPICC 2019), he was awarded a full scholarship to participate in the 2nd edition of the Toolbox International Creative Academy (TICA).

Wong is currently studying music at the Chinese University of Hong Kong in the final year taking composition stream, also majoring in pipe organ under Dr. Anne Lam. His compositions are focused in Chinese orchestral and contemporary chamber works. Recent works include Wind Quintet Wandering Glimmer and Broken Light written for the Hong Kong Wind Kamerata and Zheng Concerto Aurora IV. Storm, Kent Olofsson and Ricordi artist Luca Francesconi at the Malmö Academy of Music, Wong had two successful European premieres, adding brass ensemble piece Lointain electroacoustic-instrumental work Aurora 0 - Search for Light, written for erhu and surrounded sound, to his œuvre. At his hometown, the chamber work *Paddy Field* was performed by Ensemble Mise-en in 2018. The Mivos Quartet performed his work Oblivion at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. All but Love for orchestra was premiered by the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra and Erhu Trio Mixture entered the 'Match-making Concert' by RTHK. For Chinese music, Wong's works Entanglements and Fanfare were selected for the 'Music from the Heart' concerts of the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra. In March 2016, his Chinese orchestral miniature ... Standing at the far end of street, where the candlelight is the dimmest was performed and discussed in the orchestral workshop at the Chinese Music Without Bounds - International Composers' Summit. He also actively participated in 'Bauhinia Concerts' in the university.

Studied in the studio of Mr. Cheung Wai-fung, Wong is also an active *erhu* musician. Currently the Concertmaster of the Hong Kong Youth Chinese Orchestra, he has followed the orchestra to tours in Singapore, Taiwan, Shenyang and Shanghai. Wong participates in the Chamber Chinese Orchestra of the Chinese University of Hong Kong as *erhu* musician and student conductor and has toured in Tsinghua University at Beijing China, as well as University of Cambridge and University of Oxford in the United Kingdom as delegation of the university.

Epiphyllum Tam Yat-sing

Refreshingly fragrant, the epiphyllum flower blooms only at night for a brief time; it gives it the nickname "Beauty under the Moon". The music envisages a chance encounter with blooming epiphyllum flowers, and is divided into four sections: Shadow of the Moon, Faint Fragrance, Dance of the Spirits, and Beauty under the Moon.

Tam Yat-sing Composer

Tam Yat-sing is a young musician born in Hong Kong. He holds a Bachelor of Music and a Master of Arts (Music) degrees from the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is well-versed in many Chinese and Western musical instruments, having trained in the piano under Bernard Hui, the cello under Cheung Ming-yuen and the *yangqin* as a minor instrument under Chan Kwok-fai during his studies at the university.

Tam joined the New Tune Chinese Orchestra in 2007 and has toured Canada, Indonesia, Beijing, Gansu, Sichuan, Chaozhou and Zhuhai with the group. He is now a cello and double bass player in the Orchestra. He is currently Secretary and Head of Publication of the New Tune Music Association. He performed as piano solo in *Yellow River Concerto* in August 2014, and played *Le carnaval des animaux* in March 2013 (both pieces re-orchestrated for Chinese Orchestra by the late Yau Siu-pun). Performance aside, Tam has also served as adjudicator for the Tuen Mun District Chinese and Western Musical Instrument Competition.

Tam learned composition under Yau Siu-pun. In 2017, his composition, Beating the Petty Person, swept off three prizes at the Chinese Music Without Bounds International Composition Competition, including 'Best Work on a Hong Kong Theme', 'Media and Publishers' Composition' Favourite Original and 'Audience Favourite Original Composition' which was voted by the audience on site. The work made its world premiere at the Finals Concert of the Competition. His Taotiethe Glutton (also won the audience's and orchestra member's votes on the favourite original work), Lautau Peak and Leaping Over the Dragon Gate was premiered at the 'Music from the Heart' concert series of the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra in 2019, 2018 and 2016 respectively.

Renovated Tradition – Mysterious Rain, Dance Austin Leung

Renovated Tradition is a suite, with each short piece featuring some traditional elements, but in many ways, also attempts to break free from them. Mysterious Rain and Dance are two short standalone works.

Mysterious Rain forms different textures by employing the different tonal colours within the configuration of a Chinese orchestra. The short, dynamic passages have a subtle, transformative quality to them.

Dance carries a light and brisk rhythm and features a melody that is alternated between the orchestra and the solo instrumentation. Although the piece has very traditional elements, its development introduces possibilities for tonal changes in a Chinese orchestra.

Austin Leung Composer

An up-and-upcoming composer from Hong Kong, Austin Leung holds a Master of Music in Music Composition from the Royal Academy of Music, London. He is currently a PhD candidate in Music Composition at the University of Hong Kong. He was the first Hong Kong winner of the Royal Philharmonic Society Composition Prize.

Leung is passionate about composing new works of Chinese music, and his compositions range from solos to works for full-size orchestras. They have been performed by the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, Windpipe Chinese Music Ensemble, Chinese Music Virtuosi, and Hong Kong New Music Ensemble.

I Dreamt I Saw a Sunken Sea

Wu Kwan-yu

The theme and conceit of I Dreamt I Saw a Sunken Sea are based on scenes that the composer saw in his dreams. An effort is made to describe a space created from the sea and the night with modern music techniques and its obscured and mysterious mood. The piece consists of two short movements. The first, The Nightingale, builds on string clusters linked by cantabile melodies from the winds plucked-strings, creating a dimly lit environment; the second movement, The Sunken Sea, is made up of fragmentary passages that depict the sea in its various states seen from different angles and perspectives, before it closes with everything sinking into the pitch black depths.

Wu Kwan-yu Composer

Wu Kwan-yu is currently an undergraduate minoring in Music at the University of Hong Kong. He studied composition and instrumentation under Professor Joshua Chan. A long-time *sheng* and piano player, he has been awarded a Diploma in Sheng Performance and Grade 8 for the piano. While in secondary school, he was the leader of the La Salle College Chinese Orchestra and was a *sheng* performer with the Hong Kong Juvenile & Youth Chinese Classical Orchestra. He was a member of the HKU Chamber Singers and had performed on many occasions. His duet for *sheng* and *zhongruan*, *August Nocturne*, was featured in the 2015 'Music from the Heart' concert series presented by the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra.

Leung Hong-yu Composer

Leung Hong-yu is in his first year of undergraduate studies in Music at The Chinese University of Hong Kong. He started to explore 20th century and contemporary music a year ago, and now his orientation has shifted from the orchestral works of the Romantic Period to chamber works with more of a contemporary touch. His first work with contemporary sounds was featured at the 2019 'Bauhinia Concert'. Moreover, his works *Echoes of Spring* and *Deadline Jitters* are also selected for New Generation 2020 organized by the Hong Kong Composers Guild and Ensemble in Residence 2020 of The Chinese University of Hong Kong respectively.

Besides Music Composition, Leung majoring in violin under the supervision of Goh Ching. He was also trained under Alan Kwong and Jensen Lung.
